Brief Syllabus

Lecture	Description
1. Meta-philosophy	An examination of the nature, scope, and identity of Islamic philosophy, with particular attention to competing historiographical and methodological approaches to its interpretation.
2. Knowledge and Conceptual System	An introduction to major epistemological theories in Islamic philosophy, including conception and assent, acquired and presential knowledge, certainty, demonstration, justification, and self-awareness.
3. Language, Meaning, and Hermeneutics	A study of philosophical approaches to language, signification, meaning, predication, and interpretation, including the interaction of logic, grammar, theology, legal theory, and scriptural hermeneutics.
4. Metaphysics	An overview of the central metaphysical problems of Islamic philosophy, including being, essence and existence, necessity and possibility, causation, universals, and major post-Avicennan developments.
5. God and Divinity	An examination of philosophical arguments

	concerning the existence and nature of God, divine unity and simplicity, the divine attributes, knowledge, agency, and the relation between God and creation.
6. Philosophical Psychology	A study of philosophical theories of the soul and its faculties, including perception, imagination, self-awareness, intellect, the soul-body relation, and the question of immortality.
7. Society	An exploration of philosophical accounts of human association, cooperation, civilization, political community, social order, and historical change, with particular attention to al-Fārābī and Ibn Khaldūn.
8. Morality and Politics	An introduction to Islamic philosophical ethics and political thought, focusing on virtue, character, happiness, practical reason, justice, law, political authority, and the relationship between individual and communal flourishing.
